Loving Discipline 2021-05-29

Hebrews 12:5-11

⁵ And have you forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as sons?

"My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him.

⁶ For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives."

⁷ It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline? ⁸ If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons. ⁹ Besides this, we have had earthly fathers who disciplined us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? ¹⁰ For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. ¹¹ For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.

None of us run the race as we should, we need God's discipline to help overcome what impedes us running the race.

- Discipline proves God's love and our sonship. <u>Hebrews 12:5-6, Revelation 3:19</u> Difference between divine punishment and divine discipline.
 - punishment, God judges His enemies with condemnation/wrath, retribution as goal
 - Father punished Jesus Christ for us....gospel.
 - **discipline**, Father loves His children with righteousness/holiness as goal.
 - Hand that disciplines you is hand that loves you.

Divine discipline is the mark of genuine sonship....discipline your own children not others.

- Discipline is part of the Holy Spirit making us ready for our inheritance.
 - Then illegitimate children = no discipline and no inheritance.

Discipline essential part of father-son relationship. <u>Hebrews 12:7, Ephesians 6:4</u>

- good fathers try to train/discipline in love but often fail.
 - Do/shouldn't, not do/should, irritation/anger,
 - Ask for forgiveness and forgive parents for their failures.
- If abusive father, it is hard to believe God is loving when He disciplines you.
 - God perfectly disciplines without mistakes always in unconditional love with pure motives.

Greek paideia (pi·dA·uh) = disciplinary correction: used of training children for:

- Correct: not repeat same mistakes;
- Protect: prevent from sinning;
- Educate: self and others through your experience;
- Mature: grow in godly character/Holy Spirit fruit. Job's afflictions

All discipline is painful, never easy/pleasant for the moment; not meant to discourage but to produce fruit of peace/right profitable for eternity. <u>Hebrews 12:5, 8</u>

- Trials/difficulties are fact of life, but how we respond to them is choice.
 - Illegitimate children of God regard lightly (not big/got away with) or crushed.
 - true child treats all difficulties as training opportunities to shape character, grow/learn from God. Hebrews 12:10-11, 1b, John 15:2

Greek "trained" = English gymnasium. Indicates physical training or exercise.

- meant literally to practice naked: athlete stripped all needless weight/encumbrances
 - o idea here: voluntarily submit with the right attitude to goal of discipline.
- true child submits and sees hard things that happen in life as designed by God to grow us in holiness. Revelation 3:19, Job 1:21-22, 2:10b

Discipline proves God's love and our sonship.

- It's out of love, God disciplines all His children, godly and irresponsible, for growth in Christlikeness.
 - Examine heart, submit to God, desire to learn/grow in holiness.
 - If earthly father's imperfect discipline beneficial, then surely Heavenly Father's perfect discipline infinitely more profitable.
