Nahum: An End to God's Patience 2023-09-10

Nahum 1:7-8

The Lord is good, a stronghold in the day of trouble; he knows those who take refuge in him.

8 But with an overflowing flood he will make a complete end of the adversaries, and will pursue his enemies into darkness.

Lord of the Rings: Fellowship of the Rings in 2001.

- In 760 BC, Nineveh repent at Jonah's preaching and God withheld His wrath.
 - 150 years later Nineveh's sin and evil worse than before repentance.
 See outline at the end.
- Now no chance to escape judgement: no prophet sent, no warning, no call to repent.
- God patient for long time, but He is God of absolute justice.
 663-612 BC Lesson: There is an end to God's patience toward sin. Nahum 1:14a, 2:6,

13a, 3:1, 19
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- Destruction of 300-year-old empire seem unlikely: capital Nineveh largest in world.
 - Walls 8 miles around, 100' high, wide enough for 3 chariots side by side, moat 150' wide and 60' deep.... provisions to withstand 20-year siege.
 - God sovereign over nature and nations: use Babylonians and flood to judge Assyria.

612 BC destroyed so completely Alexander the Great (331 BC) not know city been there.

- Before 1842 (when Nineveh discovered), scholars thought Nineveh was mythical, never existed.
 - Today Nineveh is fields, water tower for nearby village, cemetery, dump!

Lesson of **Nahum** and city of **Nineveh**: there is an **end** to **God's patience** toward sin.

- Patience in delay of execution of God's wrath upon evil for purpose of leading people to repent. <u>Nahum 1:3, Romans 2:4-5, 2 Peter 3:9-10</u>
 - God slow to anger, abundant in loving-kindness, do not interpret as indifference to sin.

Not want to live in world where one in charge not care about evil or sin.... unhindered.

- Judges that allow violate moral code without punishment are unjust.
 - Wrath God's real, emotional response to sin and evil.
 Deuteronomy 29:27-28

- God's wrath means he intensely hates everything opposed to His moral character and He will take action to correct it.
 - National and personal implications.

A just God does **not leave guilty** go **unpunished**, yet **wrath** seems **negative concept**.

- **Reshape** God **without** less desirable attributes...**unbiblical**. <u>See Charles</u> Spurgeon quote at the end.
 - Viewed alone, God's wrath arouse only fear and dread.

Must understand God's **wrath rooted** in justice and **truth**, His holiness and **love**.

- Father's love displayed at cross, where Jesus object of Father's intense hatred and wrath against sin. <u>Hebrews 2:17; Romans 3:23-25</u>
 - Propitiation and atonement at epicenter of God's love.
 - Propitiation: a sacrifice that turns away wrath of God and thereby makes God favorable toward us.

Nahum **help** understand **necessity of cross:** there is an **end** to **God's patience** toward sin, **but** God provide **way escape** His **wrath**. *Nahum 1:7-8, 15, 1 John 4:10, 1 Thessalonians 1:10*

- At cross God's wrath, justice, mercy, and love came together.
 - o No one who turns to God in faith ever experience His wrath.
 - Christian no wrath, but discipline manifestation of His love.

Nahum provide comfort that in proper time everything judged righteously.

- Name Nahum means Comforted. Shortened of Nehemiah, meaning "the comfort of Yahweh."
 - Temporary mercy does not compromise ultimate sense of justice for all in end.

Nahum gives **hope** that **LORD good**, a **refuge** in times of trouble, injustice.

 Because of cross, grace, and mercy Christian NEVER receive wrath of God.
