Your Good Shepherd 2024-06-30

Psalm 23:1

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

The Father and child, and the **Shepherd** and sheep are the most **tender** and caring **relationships repeated** in the **Word**.

- "Sheep" is the **favorite term** of **Jesus** when He **refers** to **Christians**, because **we** are **like sheep**.
 - We are weak, defenseless, foolish, fearful, stubborn, wandering, and dependent.
 - No other livestock requires more diligent care, day and night.
- Your Good Shepherd is relentlessly vigilant, constantly attentive, and patiently loving you.

To be in the flock of the loving Good Shepherd, and truly know the sweetness of His care in Psalm 23 you must first pass through the gate of Psalm 22: the Psalm of the Cross. John 10:9 &11, Psalm 22:16-18, 23:3, 6

- Through the cross, the Good Shepherd provides for all His sheep's spiritual and physical needs.
 - Goodness meets needs, Mercy and Restoration are forgiveness, sanctification, and strength.

The Good Shepherd **knows each** sheep **intimately**: in Psalm 23, He uses **personal pronouns**. <u>John 10:14-15, Psalm 23:1</u>

- **He knows each** sheep's **name** and they recognize His voice.
- He takes personal care: Each night the Shepherd examines each sheep for injuries or problems.
 - Special care and attention are given to the hurting, sick, and weak.
 - The Good Shepherd knows your hurts, fears, pain, trials, failures, and sin.

Intimacy with the Good Shepherd **produces confidence** that **He** will **care** for **you**.

- "not want": refers to the experience of times of needing and wanting, but you
 won't be lacking anything (<u>future</u> tense) that the Good Shepherd thinks is good
 for us spiritually and physically.
 - The Good Shepherd supplies ALL the needs of His sheep. <u>2 Peter 1:3</u>, <u>Philippians 4:19</u>, Psalm 23:2, 119:105
 - The Good Shepherd will guide you to provision (green pasture) and peace (still water) by leading you to Himself through the Word and Holy Spirit.
 - He is more than enough for you now and through all eternity!

The Good Shepherd's guidance is necessary because he knows the territory or world and the needs of the specific flock.

- **Some** sheep **refuse** to be **led**, always wanting to go on their **own way** and **where** they **please**.
 - Continually wandering sheep are not safe, and lead others into danger (cliff).
 - But the Good Shepherd is patient and forgives because He knows sheep do sheep-things.
- If the sheep are led by the shepherd (not wander on own) into a dangerous place, the sheep don't fear because know they are protected by the Good Shepherd. <u>Psalm 23:3-4, see Spurgeon quote at the end.</u>
 - There is not "no evil" or no difficult times, but we are comfortable and secure because we are confident the Shepherd is there and will lead us through hard things...even death.
 - He never leads us into sin, but sometimes getting to the good pasture is through dangerous, dark places... Strong faith comes through trials.

Psalm 23 portrays the Christian life as a pilgrimage with the Good Shepherd into eternity with our Good Shepherd. *Psalm 23:4, 6, John 10:27-28*

- Our Good Shepherd constantly provides, protects, guides, and cares for His sheep. His sheep are never unattended.
 - "You are with me" is the joy, comfort, and absolute security of being a Christian!
- Jesus **knows** you **completely**, **loves** you **perfectly** and **wants fellowship** with you.
 - He desires for you to experience abundant life in and through Him. <u>John</u>
 10:10. 15:5
 - Abundant life begins and ends with Jesus Christ...we are content because we are convinced we will never lack anything the Good Shepherd knows is good for you.... We get all this and Jesus too!
- Trust Jesus Christ in green pastures of prosperity or dark valleys of trials.
 - He is relentlessly vigilant, constantly attentive, patiently loving you and always has your best interests at heart.... trust your Good Shepherd!

It's not "the valley of death," but "the valley of the shadow of death," for death in its substance has been removed, and only the shadow of it remains. When there is a shadow there must be light somewhere. Let us then rejoice that there is a light beyond. Nobody is afraid of a shadow, for a shadow cannot stop a man's pathway even for a moment. The shadow of a dog cannot bite; the shadow of a sword cannot kill; the shadow of death cannot destroy us. Let us not, therefore, be afraid.

Charles Spurgeon
