The Perfect Son of Man 2024-07-14

Mark 10:45

For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many."

The title Son of God affirms Jesus' divinity, as the title Son of man affirms his humanity.

- The Son of Man is an Old Testament and New Testament title. It's a racial name of Messiah as representative Man.
 - The title has a double meaning: human being and exalted heavenly one. <u>Daniel 7:13-14</u>, <u>Matthew 26:63-65</u>

Jesus Christ used the title Son of Man more than any other for Himself: a total of 84 times in the Gospels.

• Through the perfect Son of Man, (the 2nd heavenly Adam) we can get back what was lost when Adam (1st earthly) sinned: fellowship with God without fear of judgement.

To be our **representative**, the Messiah **must** be a **man**. <u>Hebrews 2:14, 17a, Colossians 2:9,</u>

- Jesus joyfully humbled Himself by taking on full humanity.
 - o Jesus was completely God and completely man simultaneously.
 - One person with two natures and wills, divine and human, with neither being diminished.

The virgin birth made it possible that Jesus could become truly human without inherited sin.... legal guilt and corruption are a moral nature inherited from Adam. Luke 1:35, 3:23.

• Not only transmitted through father but the Holy Spirit somehow prevented transmission of corrupt nature from Mary... Not too hard for the Creator of the universe.

He was so fully human that His **brothers**, **people** that He **lived** and worked with for **30** years **didn't realize** He was **anything more** than a very **good human** being. *Matthew* 13:54-57a, *John* 7:5

- Jesus entered fully into the human experience: learned things, had human emotions, physical limitations, experienced victories, trials, and suffering.
 - Jesus sets examples on how endure struggle, loneliness, humiliation, and abuse.
 - He knows how to overcome human challenges in the midst of living holy and joyful lives. <u>1 Peter 2:20-24a</u>

Jesus Christ, **perfect Son of Man**, had normal **human needs**, **emotions**, limitations and **temptations**.

• **Divine** nature could **not** be **tempted** but **human** nature **could** and **was tempted** in **every way**, yet He **NEVER sinned**. <u>Hebrews 4:15, 1 John 3:5</u>

- How Jesus' two natures united to face temptation, Scripture does not explain.
 - It's not impossible, it's merely a mystery we do not now fully understand.

It seems Jesus met every temptation not by relying on His divine nature to make obedience easier, but by the strength of His human nature. <u>Matthew</u> 4:1-4

- Jesus experienced suffering and temptation we can't comprehend, and yet responded with perfect obedience to the Father...succeeding where Adam and where we have failed.
 - Because the Son of Man endured every kind of temptation without sinning, He knows how help you when you're tempted. <u>Hebrews 2:16-18</u>
 - We can resist temptation through the Son of Man's empowering, indwelling Spirit.

Jesus Christ made a way to fellowship with God without fear of judgment through His representative, imputed, perfect obedience and substitute sacrificial death. *Hebrews 2:9, Mark 10:45, Romans 5:19, 2 Corinthians 5:21*

- Old Testament sacrifices show how a substitute could pay the sin penalty, so we are right with God.
 - o If Jesus is **not** fully **man**, He is **not a sufficient substitute** to **die** in **our place** and **pay** our **penalty**.

Through the Son of Man's sinless life, substitute death and glorious resurrection, Jesus made a way for the sons of Adam get back what was lost when Adam sinned: fellowship with God without fear of judgement.

- Son of Man's **humanity assures** His **understanding** and **mercy** when we fall to temptation.
 - His deity assures his strength to resist temptation and live holy lives.
