# When Not to Be Content 2024-09-15

#### Matthew 5:6

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied."

Scripture teaches us to be content with every gift from our Heavenly Father.

- When we are **content** with **whatever** the Lord **provides**, that **says** to the world, "**Jesus Christ** is **my treasure**".
  - Never be content with where you are at spiritually: in maturity or Christ-likeness (holy).

Jesus uses the strongest impulses in the natural realm to represent the depth of desire Christians should have for holiness and righteousness. <u>Matthew 5:6, Philippians 3:12-15, Psalm 42:1-2,</u>

- Focus not on the actions of satisfying hungering and thirsting, but the craving.
  - The starving and thirsting have an all-consuming passion for food and water.
    - They do not have to be begged to eat if they're hungry or drink if they're thirsty.

In Greek, verbs like hunger and thirst normally have objects that indicate partialness.

 Hunger and thirst for some food and water, not for all the food and water in the world.

Here Jesus uses words that make righteousness an unqualified, unlimited object of hunger and thirst for all the righteousness there is.

- Christians are made righteous in God's sight through Jesus' imputed righteousness: justification. 2 Corinthians 5:21.
  - Here the present participle signifies continuous longing and seeking: sanctification.

**Hunger** and thirst for **righteousness** is just as **real** and **natural** as **hunger** and **thirst of fleshly cravings**.

- By God's grace we hunger and thirst after righteousness the same way we daily hunger and thirst for food and drink.
  - Pursuing righteousness is a sign of spiritual life.... the dead do not eat or drink. <u>2 Peter 1:5-10, John 6:35</u>
- The spiritually hungry do not desire Jesus and anything else to satisfy, but only Jesus.
  - Looking for satisfaction in the lesser means constant cravings. <u>See</u>
     Captain Barbossa quote at the end
- All the soul needs for satisfaction, joyful and life you already possess in Jesus Christ.

Our part is to seek and holiness, His part is to satisfy. <u>Matthew 5:6, Psalm 107:9, 23:1-3</u>

- Satisfied is a very strong and graphic word. It was originally applied to feed or fatten an animal.
  - It's different than 'satisfied': It's not like eating pie until you can't eat more, "so satisfied".
    - Here, it is so satisfying that your appetite increases and wants more.
  - It's not 1 big meal but a daily, continual feasting. <u>See DeYoung</u> quote at the end

**Ultimately** only **God makes** us **like Jesus**, but **holiness** is a **collaborative** effort **between you** and the Holy Spirit. <u>See The Well in M&E 9/13 quote at the end.</u> <u>Philippians 2:12-13 & 1:6, 1 Corinthians 9:25-27</u>

- Sanctification and holiness usually stalls for lack of effort on our part.
  - We coast or slack and blame a lack of fruit on God's sovereignty.
     <u>Proverbs 26:15, Romans 6:1, 14</u>
- Mild antinomianism: instead of repenting and pursuing holiness we abuse grace, and are content to live casual, indifferent, sinful lives.
  - o It seems liberating but leaves us trapped in a sin and excuse cycle.
    - The cost is great: spiritual starvation.
- Grace covers failures but it includes the Holy Spirit's help to turn from sin and obey.

Never be content with where you are at spiritually. Rejoice and delight in things you are saved from and pursue things Jesus has saved you to: freedom, obedience, and holiness.

- Don't be content with little holiness, biblical and theological knowledge, a slightly better marriage, little personal spiritual growth and fruit, etc.
  - God desires so much more for YOU. <u>Psalm 63:1, 2 Corinthians 1:20, 1 Timothy 6:6</u>
- You'll experience more contentment in life if you always a have healthy
  discontentment with where you are at spiritually that drives you
  pursue Christ-likeness more.
